





Information for young people with disability (School Leavers) fact sheet

Overview

Inclusive Employment Australia provides Eligible School Leavers (ESL) with disability additional support during the transition from school into the workplace.

Within this factsheet you can find more information on ESL and other available supports for young people with disability.

Who are Eligible School Leavers?

ESL is a person who is:

- under 22 years of age
- with a significant disability
- of legal working age
- needing assistance from study to post-school open employment.

A person with a 'significant disability' refers to a person who has major barriers to employment and may require ongoing support in employment.

An ESL could be:

- in their final year of schooling
- exiting an eligible post-school employment
- in a work transition program
- exiting School Leaver Employment Supports (SLES) through the NDIS.

An ESL's final year of schooling is generally Year 12, but may be earlier if the student, parents and school have agreed this will be the student's final schooling year.

An ESL participant will have a physical or mental impairment that limits their functional capacity relating to:

- mobility
- communication
- self-care
- self-direction
- work tolerance
- work skills.

How can Inclusive Employment Australia providers help?

Inclusive Employment Australia providers can help ESL participants with:

- writing a resume
- getting ready to work
- training in specific job skills
- writing job applications
- looking for jobs that suit you
- preparing for a job interview.

Please note an ESL participant:

- **Does not** need to be a NDIS participant to enter the Inclusive Employment Australia program.
- **Will** need your own Centrelink Customer Reference Number (CRN) to access ESL.

Other programs to help young people
